Research Updates

Outcomes Framework launched – How do we know if Children's Social Care Services make a difference?

The research team (Lisa Holmes, Ivana La Valle, Di Hart and Vânia Pinto) launched the project report and presented the findings on 12 July at the Nuffield Foundation.

The study found a consensus that children's social care services (CSCS) need better evidence to make well-informed decisions about service planning and delivery, particularly given the increased pressures due to a rise in demand for CSCS at a time of declining resources. As a first step to improve the evidence base the project team developed an outcomes framework for CSCS. The framework presented in the full project report is based on the views of those who plan, deliver and use these services, as well as the research evidence.

The outcomes framework is meant to complement, rather than replace, national administrative data collected by the Department for Education (DfE). Next steps include piloting the framework with a small group of local authorities. <u>More on the project including summary and full report (funded by Nuffield Foundation)</u>
