Therapeutic Residential Care

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International Work Group for Therapeutic Residential Care

Throughout July our Director, Dr Lisa Holmes, has been working with international colleagues to run a series of work group sessions focused on Therapeutic Residential Care (TRC). Lisa co-chairs the International Work Group for Therapeutic Residential Care with Professor Emeritus Jim Whittaker (University of Washington) and Professor Jorge Del Valle (University of Oviedo). In lieu of a face-to-face gathering later in 2020, the group progressed their work to examine internationally comparative data around TRC. The group also focused on family engagement and adaptations to practice in response to Covid-19.
