Summer is here, so it's time to share a few updates from our community at the Rees Centre.

## Assessing the feasibility of a supplementary health assessment measure for young people in residential and foster care



We're extremely pleased to announce a new research project launching at the Centre, led by <u>Dr Áine Kelly</u>, and supported by <u>Dr Nikki Luke</u>. The project, funded by <u>Foundations</u>, aims to assess the feasibility of a supplementary health assessment measure for young people in residential and foster care.

Currently, as Áine highlights, "the information collected for the SSDA903 return only looks at whether young people have had their health assessment that year and does not capture the young people's health needs, the support they may need, or whether their health needs are being met. We also know that young people are at risk of disengaging with health assessments as they get older". Therefore, the project aims to co-produce a questionnaire that can be used in health assessments to support the information collected by nurses.

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This feasibility study provides the basis for future work in which Áine hopes to conduct a larger trial to explore how the questionnaire could support local authorities and clinical commissioning groups to make sure there are enough support services available, while also identifying training needs for caregivers, social care, and healthcare staff. Young people from residential and foster care and their caregivers will support in the design of the questionnaire, focusing on issues that are important to them, whilst also exploring the best way of collecting this information from young people in the future. Health and social care professionals are also being enlisted to advise on how the questionnaire might promote positive outcomes for young people in care, what outcomes these might be, and how these outcomes might be measured to assess the impact of the questionnaire in the future.

The project will run until Spring 2024.

### **Evaluation of the Pupil Premium Plus Post-16 Programme**



We are delighted to announce that the Rees Centre and Cordis Bright are working together on an evaluation for the Department for Education of its Pupil Premium Plus Post-16 Programme.

The Pupil Premium Plus Post-16 programme aims to improve outcomes for looked after children and care leavers in post-16 education, with a particular focus on improving attendance, retention and attainment. The Rees Centre previously completed a six-month pilot evaluation of the programme in 30 local authorities between September 2021 and March 2022. The Programme was subsequently extended to a further 28 local authority areas in September 2022 and is being rolled out across all local authorities in England from September 2023.

The current evaluation will initially run until March 2025, and the team is led by Cordis Bright. At the Centre, work will be led by <u>Prof Leon Feinstein</u>, with Centre researchers <u>Dr Georgia Hyde-Dryden</u> leading case study analysis, and statistical analysis from <u>Dr Nikki Luke</u>. Work on cost benefit will be led by Cordis Bright and <u>Prof Steve McIntosh</u> at the University of Sheffield.

## Bright Spots: Learning from Research

Last month, as part of the ongoing <u>Bright Spots</u> <u>Programme</u> (a partnership between Coram Voice and the Centre), <u>Prof Julie Selwyn</u> presented at the <u>Coram BAAF</u> webinar "Learning from Research: The wellbeing of children in care - comparing those in Data and Digital Fund.

The report sets out findings from a narrative literature review and an expert consultation, conducted by <u>Prof Leon Feinstein</u> and <u>Dr Georgia</u> <u>Hyde-Dryden</u> at the Centre in collaboration with Dr Mary Baginsky and Rick Hood.

The report was also presented to the House of Parliament on the 6th July 2023.

The presentation showcased data from Bright Spots, examining the views of over 1,200 children (aged 4 -10 years) and young people (aged 11-18 years) in kinship foster care in over 38 local authorities.




## **Congratulations Jenny!**
